Boasting a world-wide reputation, Fairmont Hotels and Resorts is the largest operator of luxury hotels and resorts in North America, with a unique collection of world-class resorts and city center hotels that enjoy unrivalled prominence.

The company has a long tradition of investing into the communities in which they are located and are strong supporters of organizations doing proactive work for women.

"By ensuring equality rights for women and girls in Canada, LEAF plays a vital role in our community and in our country."

"With half of Fairmont staff and visitors being women we feel we have an ethical obligation to support initiatives championed by organizations such as LEAF," continues Ms. Layton.

In addition to their participation at the Toronto Persons' Day Breakfast and ongoing support, Fairmont has also generously offered to supply LEAF with the prize trip for the popular sweeps mailing contest.

"All of us at LEAF are excited to welcome Fairmont as a new sponsor and look forward to a long association with them. The generosity of companies such as Fairmont allow us to keep doing the essential work we do for women in Canada," says Joanne McLean, LEAF Foundation Board member.

From a legal perspective the last six months have been very busy for LEAF. In October, 2000, LEAF enjoyed two Supreme Court victories. The first was Blencoe v. British Columbia, where LEAF intervened to ensure that two sexual harassment complaints against a former British Columbia cabinet minister proceeded. The Supreme Court unanimously agreed that the complaints had to continue and subsequent to the Court's decision, Blencoe was found guilty and ordered to pay damages.

In Darrach v. The Queen, the Supreme Court upheld important provisions in the criminal law which protect the dignity and equality of women who press charges of sexual assault. The Court held that accused persons do not have an automatic right to question a woman about her sexual past. LEAF had strongly supported this legislation so was thrilled with the resulting decision.

In January 2001, LEAF intervened at the Supreme Court again in a family law case: Boston v. Boston. The Boston case deals with when and how pension benefits can be included in spousal support. The Bostons were married for 35 years, during which time the husband worked and the wife stayed at home with the family. After their divorce, and following his retirement, the husband sought to limit the amount of support paid to his former wife. This case will have a significant impact on elderly women in Canada who continue to be one of our poorest populations.

In addition to its Supreme Court work, LEAF is also active in the provincial courts. In December, LEAF intervened at the Ontario Court of Appeal in *Falkiner v. Ontario*. At issue was whether Ontario's social assistance laws may treat, as spouses, two people, of the opposite sex, who are living in

the same residence. The applicants in Falkiner are single mothers who lost their benefits because of this rule. Supported by LEAF, they argued that the rule is discriminatory and is based on outdated assumptions about women and their economic dependence on men.

Finally, LEAF is currently working on an intervention in the Supreme Court in the case of *Shearing v. The Queen*. At issue is the ability of an accused person to cross-examine a complainant about what she has or has not written in her diary. The case also deals with the use of "similar fact" evidence, in this case with respect to a number of sexual offences committed by the accused. This is yet another case dealing with the continuing problem of violence against women, and LEAF continues to be there to fight for women's interests.

LEAF Manitoba/Winnipeg received the "Mayor's Volunteer Service Award" at a luncheon attended by 1,450 people and hosted at the convention centre on April 26th, 2001. The award recognized the women of LEAF Winnipeg in the category of Mobilization of Volunteers. The LEAF Branch in Winnipeg is well known to us as a very active dedicated group who do some wonderful work in Winnipeg and for LEAF.

Each April the Premier of Manitoba proclaims Volunteer week. The Winnipeg Board decided to nominate their program volunteers this year because it is also the International Year of the Volunteer. LEAF Winnipeg treated 20 of their volunteers to this luncheon and plan to hold a broader recognition event later in the year.

Betty Hopkins wrote the submission using the theme "the strength of one – the power of many – the synergy of shared equality seeking!" She explained, "I do approach volunteer involvement as citizenship in action–community building–community development and I believe in the synergy of working together with shared support, openness and transparency." Daria Kiperchuk and Cyndi Forcand received the Award on behalf of LEAF Winnipeg.

Congratulations On a Job Well Done! Persons Day, IWD Events Bring In Record Amount

LEAF's annual Persons Day Breakfast was one of the most successful to date! Through the efforts of dedicated supporters we raised an impressive \$172,000 for the organization. A big heartfelt thanks goes out to everyone that helped make the latest breakfasts so successful - you are all very much appreciated!

Originally held in celebration of the landmark Persons Case and as a breakfast, LEAF's annual event may now occur at different times of the year and day. They are hosted by various LEAF branches and affiliate groups across the country and feature speakers from all different walks of life who have in common a strong belief in the importance of LEAF's work.

This past year LEAF supporters joined together from coast to coast to enjoy many event highlights. In central Canada, close to 1,000 people attended the Toronto breakfast hosted by Barbara Hall and featuring speaker Ann Coombs, a consultant in consumer research, marketing and e-commerce. Major sponsors included C.A. Delaney Capital Management Ltd., Devlin Applied Design, Starbucks Coffee Company, The Toronto Star and Toronto Hydro Energy Services.

LEAF Sudbury enjoyed a great turnout as over 600 supporters met at the Caruso Club to hear the Honourable Margaret Norri McCain speak. Lead sponsors included TD Canada Trust, Global Travel Destinations, Cyber Beach Communications, Journal Printing and the Law Office of Joseph Michael Fragomeni.

In Kingston around 250 people met at a day long symposium at Queen's University to hear Judy Rebick and Maude Barlow discuss the progress of women since the 1970 Royal Commission on the Status of Women. The highlight for most was participating with women of all ages as they shared history and planned for a better future.

In Western Canada, Kim Pate, Executive Director of the Canadian Association of Elizabeth Fry Societies, did double duty and spoke at both the Regina and Saskatoon breakfasts about restorative justice issues for women. In total close to 400 people came out to show their support. The lead sponsors at the Saskatoon event were Halyk Harradence and The College of Law, University of Saskatchewan while Jacqui Shumiatcher was the major corporate sponsor in Regina. In Edmonton Judy Rebick spoke to a crowd of about 240 people. Fraser Milner Casgrain was the top sponsor.

LEAF Manitoba's Persons Day Breakfast was the biggest ever with 880 in attendance. This year's guest speaker was Sally Armstrong, former editor-in-chief of Homemaker's magazine, who spoke passionately for women's rights on a global scale. Major supporters included James Richardson & Sons, Frontier Subaru, Assante, International Institute for Sustainable Development and UNPAC. Another event highlight was the recognition of those women who have acted as Breakfast chairs since the inaugural event. Two of these dedicated supporters, Betty Hopkins and Daria Kiperchuk, have been steadily involved with LEAF Manitoba/Winnipeg since its formation.

In Victoria guests were in a unique position as both LEAF counsel and Blencoe counsel were in attendance at the breakfast however only LEAF had the opportunity to speak! This exciting breakfast, sponsored in large part by the Victoria Legal Community, garnered great media coverage and had over 230 people in attendance.

Around 450 people shared their morning cup of coffee at the Hyatt Regency in Vancouver and listened to the passion of speaker Dionne Brand as she read some of her poems. Held in March on International Woman's Day, the biggest sponsors were VTV and the West Coast Title Search.
